MENOPAUSE IN EMPLOYMENT: AN EMPLOYER'S GUIDE

Last month Pam Loch, Solicitor and Managing Director of Loch Associates Group, gave a very informative and interesting webinar to our Managing Partners' networking group including a discussion around menopause in employment which everyone found extremely useful. Pam kindly agreed to write this short guide for our Newsletter which we hope you will find helpful:

Why should employers give more thought to the menopause?

There are an increasing number of women in the workplace because:

- More women are re-joining the employment market post childbearing.
- Government policies have encouraged women to stay at work.
- The state pension age was changed which means that women need to work for longer.

However recent surveys show that 10% of menopausal women have left work because of the symptoms and 44% said their ability to work has been affected by it.

What should employers be doing?

For employers, the menopause:

- Needs to be handled sensitively with understanding and support for staff, to help to retain staff and maintain productivity.
- Be aware that it's a health and wellbeing concern: The Health and Safety at Work Act 1974, requires employers to ensure everyone's physical and mental health, safety and welfare at work.
- It may lead to claims for discrimination against the employer and potentially individuals under the Equality Act 2010, for example:
 - If severe symptoms amount to a disability.
 - Where an employee going through the menopause is discriminated against due to age or sex; or
 - Where an employee going through the menopause is subjected to harassment.

What steps should employers take to support menopausal employees in the workforce?

- Acknowledge the menopause exists in the first instance.
- Introduce a Menopause Policy or incorporate it into a Wellbeing Policy.
- Increase awareness, perhaps as part of a wider wellbeing campaign because:
 - Female employees are often not aware they may be perimenopausal or menopausal.
 - \circ $\;$ Managers may not be aware of the symptoms or the impact the menopause may have.
- Make sure you train staff to understand:
 - The menopause and its effects.
 - The impact menopause may have on staff at work and how to address it for example, better ventilation and access to water etc.
 - Where to find support and guidance

Where can employers get additional support and advice?

- <u>Acas</u> has published updated <u>menopause at work guidance</u> to help employers and managers support their staff. It includes good practice guidance for employers to help manage the effects of menopause at work.
- <u>Loch Law</u> can provide bespoke training and advice to help employers be proactive and get things right and retain their staff.

COUNCIL MEMBER'S REPORT

Law Society Council meeting on 17th January 2023

This was my first meeting in the "Council Chamber", a room that my predecessors will know well. It is semi-circular theatre style seating with a desk, microphone and array of buttons in front of each chair. These enable members to indicate that they want to speak, speak when called and vote electronically on motions. I did try and speak on SQE exams but either the technology didn't register my interest, or I wasn't called. My "maiden speech" shall have to wait. The meeting was initially chaired by the Law Society President Lubna Shuja. She left at lunch time to speak at the Justice Select Committee of the House of Commons on the subject of Criminal Legal Aid. The Law Society has been strong on this and a link to the full proceedings can be found <u>here</u>.

As noted in my last report, the Law Society has issued a JR Pre-Action Letter and I understand the Government's formal response to that is awaited. On February 6^{th,} the DPP announced that prosecution barristers will receive a pay increase comparable to the 15% + that has been awarded to defence barristers. Defence Solicitors remain stuck with a 9% increase (the first increase in over 20 years). The Council meeting on 17th January dealt with a number of issues and I have picked out two topics of interest:

1. The Law Society believes that the Government's proposed Bill of Rights would undermine the rule of law, damage Britain's international standing, and paint the UK as a nation that did not respect international agreements or human rights. It was unclear whether the Bill would be brought back to the House of Commons for its second reading as the media had reported it had been withdrawn, but The Law Society would continue to monitor developments in this area and seek to persuade members of both Houses that this was not a Bill for which they should vote.

I hadn't appreciated the full impact of this Bill until the meeting - it would leave the UK technically within the ECHR but allow UK Courts to ignore large parts of it.

The ECHR arose out of the Congress of Europe, convened by, amongst others, Winston Churchill shortly after the end of WWII. A British lawyer, Sir David Maxwell-Fyfe, was instrumental in the drafting of the Convention. Many would see it as sad were the UK to derogate from its provisions. The Law Society is fundamentally opposed to this.

 The Society commemorated 100 years of women entering the legal profession. The Society celebrated the remarkable achievements of the first four women solicitors, Carrie Morrison, Maud Crofts, Mary Pickup and Mary Sykes. However, we should all reflect on how we can continue to promote inclusion in the legal profession and ensure it reflects the diversity of our society.

This appeal concerned applications for security for costs in public interest environmental judicial review claims, including an application by the Developers to join the proceedings as additional defendants- so they could then seek security. 'The CIL appeal in Braithwaite' – One of the decisions discussed in an earlier article on the late service of a liability notice published on 2nd September 2022 was R (oao Braithwaite) v East Suffolk Council. It has been the subject of an appeal and just before Christmas the Court of Appeal decision was published ([2022] EWCA Civ 1716). The appellant developer failed and the CIL liability remains enforceable. In arriving at the decision not all the points considered by Mrs. Justice Lang DBE were discussed by Sir Keith Lindblom giving the judgment of the Court of Appeal. His judgment does, however, serve to forcefully emphasise yet further certain lessons which are discussed in section 7 at the end of <u>this article</u>.
